Admission to Belgian Territory

Students who are non-EEA citizens will need to apply for a student visa at their nearest Belgian Embassy or Consulate in their home country. Enclosed, you will find an official letter of acceptance in Dutch to be used to apply for a student visa (longer than three months). Please contact the Belgian Embassy or Consulate as soon as you have been accepted since applying for a student visa can take several months and the requirements may vary per country. Please make sure you apply for a 'D – long stay' multiple entries visa as this will allow you to travel abroad during your stay in Belgium. The Brussels School of Governance is considered a private non-profit institution. Although our programmes are not subsidised with public funding they are recognised and accredited by the Flemish Ministry of Education in Belgium. For visa purposes, students must use the name Vesalius College vzw and refer to the visa application form and requirements usually in place for "Public Educational Institutions" (article 58).

All students requesting a visa are required to provide a certificate of good conduct (Non Criminal Record Certificate), this is usually requested at your home country's law enforcement authority and may take a long time to process. If you live in the U.S., this entails an FBI investigation into your personal records, which can take at least 8 weeks to complete. As such, it is critical for you to proceed immediately with you visa application. For more information on visas, please consult the **Belgian Government website**, here.

Please note you must bring all the documents that were needed to obtain your student visa when you move to Belgium. The local Belgian officials will also ask for these documents, including proof of financial support.

Which documents do you need?

You will find on the website a list of documents to submit, one of which is proof of sufficient financial means.

The School can assist you with a **blocked account** which is basically a fixed amount of money you transfer to the university and is then monthly reimburse to you to cover living costs. A detailed explanation can be found on the **Immigration Office's website**, <u>here</u>.

Applying for a student visa can take up to several months. If your temporary residence permit arrives too late with a validity period that does not run within the period of enrolment, you will have to postpone your studies until the following semester.

Housing

Students are responsible for making their own housing arrangements. Our students can find all information about private <u>Student Housing in Brussels</u> through this platform. It is regulated by the city of Brussels so all housing on this website must follow certain regulations. There are some private residencies close to our University so it is definitely worth to check these out first. Key to these student rooms is to apply as much in advance as possible and if needed to register on their waiting list. Prices go from 330-900€ so there is a big variety.

Most of the contracts for student rooms or flats will be for at least one year. Contracts for apartments are usually three years. You will be required to pay two months of rent in advance as a "guarantee" (security deposit) and the first month of rent is due on the day <u>you sign the contract</u>. Make sure that the utilities are included in the rent (electricity, heating system, water, Wi-Fi connection). Please note you will often need to share the kitchen and bathroom. If you have questions and/or concerns about a contract, please ask the landlord for a copy and ask for a translation (or help) at the School.

We suggest that you arrive one week before Orientation if at all possible.

Health Insurance

Students are required to obtain international health insurance before arriving in Brussels. The School does not provide a health insurance plan, however, does recommend that students consider obtaining supplemental Belgian national health insurance.

In order to receive a reimbursement after any medical visits, you will have to submit a claim with your health insurance office. A comprehensive guide on how the Belgian health insurance works, can be found <u>here</u>.

Town Hall Registration

When you arrive in Brussels, you are required by law to register with the local Town Hall (called

"maison communale" or "gemeentehuis") in which you reside. Residence under the student status can be allowed for the duration of the student's study programme and as long as proof of funding can

Telephone - Internet

There are many outlets that sell mobile phone sim cards. You have the choice between three main operators: Proximus, Orange and Base. Mobile Vikings is an online provider with very competitive

prices.

Hospitals in Brussels

The Brussels-Capital Region has a large hospital infrastructure, with high-quality care for patients in

University Group Practice (UGP)

The Medical Group practice adjacent to campus is a primary health care centre accessible to students,

personnel and non-resident students. You can go to the UGP in cases of illness, accidents, for minor procedures, preventive examinations, vaccinations, contraception, dental care, wound care, travel

Course Registration

As a newly accepted student, you will register for your courses during Orientation. Each student will have an academic adviser who will help the student to select their courses and to personalise their course schedule. Our academic adviser assists students in identifying relevant courses and offer support throughout their academic career at the Brussels School of Governance.

Internship Programme

The School offers students the opportunity to work while earning university credits in some public and private organizations in the Brussels area. The listing of internship opportunities for students is updated every term (spring, summer, and fall) and is posted online. Orientation for New Students

The BSoG provides a mandatory orientation for newly accepted students at the beginning of every semester. An orientation schedule is sent to students to inform them of the dates and sessions organized during orientation.

During these sessions, students receive information on the academic and social environment of the School, course registration, dropping and adding classes (if appropriate) and other administrative issues. They will also receive information on Belgian health insurance and information on Student Services such as the College counselor and the Student Government. They are also given cultural and safety tips regarding living in Brussels. Students will have a session for the activation of their College computer accounts and are given a tour of the campus. A tour of Brussels is also organized in addition to social events organised by the Student Government.

Student Government

The Student Government (SG) is an elected student body and acts as the main liaison between students and the academic administration of the BSoG. The SG appoints representatives to the Education Council and the Board, which is the academic governance of the College, and regularly meets with the Dean on matters which affect the students at the College. The Student Government also holds a very important social role. It organises welcoming activities for new students, sports activities, seasonal parties, drama evenings and other social activities throughout the year. The members act as student ambassadors at events such as orientation, Open Day and recruitment fairs. They are very willing to give you information about the BSoG from a student perspective. Students can also be contacted for buying and selling used books and for information on participating to student clubs.

Student Support Services

Administrative Support for Students with Specific Educational Needs

Student Support Services at the Brussels School of Governance are able to offer limited administrative assistance to all students with medically documented special educational needs requirements, such as Dyslexia, Attention Deficit Disorder etc.

The assistance is offered in the form of extra time allowed for exams if requested. Specific Educational Needs Students are offered the possibility to take their Mid-term and Final Exams at the same time as the other students in the class, in a separate classroom, with a separate proctor and are allowed up to 50% extra time to complete their exams.

College Psychologist

The Brussels School of Governance offers students support for personal issues with the counseling services of Alex Anghelou, a clinical psychologist specialized in Cognitive Behaviour Therapy (CBT). He provides a safe environment for students to discuss concerns which may impede their academic progress and/or personal growth.

Libraries

All Brussels School of Governance students have access to three major libraries in Brussels: The library of the Vrije Universiteit Brussel (the VUB), located across the street from our campus, that of the Université Libre de Brussels (the ULB), located in Ixelles/Elsene and the Royal Library, located downtown. Sports on Campus

BSoG students have full access to the athletics facilities of the VUB. The sports facilities include two large multipurpose sports halls (for indoor soccer, basketball, badminton, tennis, etc.), one martial arts

hall, three squash courts, a swimming pool and one climbing wall. All facilities are indoors and, thus, are always available regardless of the weather conditions.

Next to its indoor infrastructure, the VUB Sports Department also has outdoor sports fields, including one synthetic soccer field and athletics track and rugby. For more information, please visit their website.

Students also have access to a fitness complex, **Basic Fit** This sports center consists of a 1,500 m² fitness and cardio area, a spinning studio, two large changing rooms, a relaxation area, a solarium and a dance/aerobics studio.

Travel and Public Transportation

The public transport in Belgium is operated by <u>STIB</u>, <u>De Lijn</u> (buses and trams in Flanders), <u>TEC</u> (buses in the Wallonia region) and <u>SNCB</u> (the national railway operator),

Taking into account all the services available as options, the chances are good that for most times of the day, regardless of where you are going in and around Brussels you will have the option to take public transport. The different operators have websites that can help you build or plan your trips and for an expat still exploring the city, this is a valuable tool as the sites also feature maps of the stations and stops.

Jobs in Brussels

Some students might want to consider a part-time job during your studies. However, it is important to consider the workload of studies, the number of hours you yo be dedicated to work, and commitment to extracurricular activities or personal time.
